It is our pleasure to present to you Volume 8, Number 2 of *Intersect*. We are excited to provide both our returning readers and those new to the field of Science, Technology, and Society (STS) with a window into cuttingedge research in this diverse and expanding field. This issue of *Intersect* truly showcases the interdisciplinary nature of STS: our authors explore how physical space impacts innovation and the promise and pitfalls of decentralized computer networks, among many other topics.
